

## **FUNERAL OF GEN. CHARLES K. GRAHAM.**

The pretty Twenty-third-Street Presbyterian Church was crowded yesterday morning as it rarely has been filled before, when the funeral services over the body of Gen. Charles K. Graham, who died at Lakewood, N. J., last Monday, were held. Representatives from the Union League Club, the Military Order of the Loyal Legion, the Society of the Army of the James, Phil Kearny Post, No. 8, G. A. R., the Excelsior Brigade Association, the Third Army Corps Union, the Society of the Army of the Potomac, and the New-York-Gettysburg Monument Commission were present, and the remainder of the assemblage was made up of friends of the dead soldier, military men and civilians.

The services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Robert F. Sample, pastor of the church, and a feature of the ceremony was the singing by a quartet of two ladies and two gentlemen. At the conclusion of the services at the church the casket, followed by many carriages, was taken to the Grand Central Station and thence by special train to Woodlawn Cemetery, where the body was interred.

Among those at the church were John Graham and De Witt Graham, the General's brothers; Gen. Daniel E. Sickles, Gen. Alexander Shaler, Gen. Nelson Taylor, Gen. H. E. Tremain, Gen. James P. Carr, Gen. H. A. Barnum, Major J. B. Fassett, and Charles B. Hyatt, the pall bearers, and Gen. J. Hobart Ward, Lyman G. Carter, Gen. Martin T. McMahon, ex-Congressman Thomas Stewart, Col. E. M. Ehlers, John W. Jacobus, Col. W. E. Van Wyck, Col. George H. Tynsdale, ex-Coroner John R. Nugent, Gen. Horatio C. King, Gen. Schuyler Hamilton, and Gen. Frederick De Peyster.
